Draped Bust Half Cent

For those collectors with the basic US Type set, the Draped Bust half cent is the first coin in the collection. But the pricey Flowing Hair half cent is a type that is to be included for those collectors with a larger budget.

The Draped Bust half cent was first struck in 1800, with the same design that had been in use



by the large cent since 1796. Robert Scot was the designer of the coin, and had potentially modeled the bust of lady liberty after Anne Bingham, which was painted by Gilbert Stuart in 1795.

The mintage numbers of the Draped Bust half cent vary from 202,000 to 1,055,000. Combined, roughly



3,400,000 of the coin was struck. 1801 was the only date of the series that did not see production.

Most dates are relatively common for the series, except for several varieties that saw low mintage numbers. One of them is the 1802 2 over 0 second reverse variety, which is the key date of the series and very scarce.

There are two different types of reverses used, the reverse of 1800 and the "second type" reverse. The reverse bore smaller lettering and wreath, while the second type was the opposite.

A very iconic feature depicted on the reverse of the coin is the fraction used to numerically indicate the coin's denomination. Sadly, this style was only used until 1808. The large cent also had the same fraction. Red examples of

this type is extremely scarce. Only 17 examples have received RD in the PCGS population report.

The Brasher Doubloon is the first gold coin to be struck in the US after the Revolutionary War, making it a highly coveted and sought after coin. To date, there are only 9 known to exist. And just this past Thursday, on January 21, the highest grading example was auctioned at Heritage Auctions. Grading an impressive MS65, the coin reached a staggering \$9.36 million dollar winning bid, making it the highest price paid for an NGC certified coin at auction.

Numismatists from far and wide can all agree that the Peace and Morgan dollar is one of the most popular series to collect. Who knows what will come of their return in 2021. There year 1921 marked the transition from the successful Morgan dollar over to the Peace dollar. Public Law 116-286 brought the idea to Anniversary Act.

Much effort was put into the project, in attempt to perfectly replicate the original dies used to strike the Morgan and Peace dollars a century ago. The original composition, size, and almost every aspect of the coin will be replicated in the 2021 silver dollars.

The Philadelphia mint will be striking the coins without a 'P" mintmark, while the Denver and San Francisco mints will be busy striking their own coins with the usual D and S mint marks. New Orleans and Carson City both hosted a US mint during the production of the original Morgan and Peace Dollars, so in honor of the inactive mints Philadelphia will also be striking the silver dollars with privy mark bearing the O and CC mintmarks.

The return of the Peace and Morgan dollars will likely draw a lot of attention, possibly drawing in more people to the hobby of numismatics.
